# 2010 Classical Literacy Exam


The Classical Literacy Exam is given to all Latin students in May. This competition measures basic knowledge of all aspects of Greek and Roman civilizations, including vocabulary, expressions, mythology, history, culture, quotes, geography, etc.

- 6<sup>th</sup> grade: 100+ terms, such as A.D., subpoena, and millennium.
- Level 1: 300+ terms, such as ca, mercurial, and Etruscans.
- Level 2: 450+ terms, such as sword of Damocles, Caligula, and de facto.
- Level 3: 600+ terms, such as draconian, kudos, and the Socratic Method.

The test consists of 60 fill in the blank questions:

- ➤ 45 or more correct answers earn a 'Corona Aenea' (bronze crown) ribbon.
- > 50 or more earn a 'Corona Argentea' (silver crown) ribbon.
- > 55 or more earn a 'Corona Aurea' (gold crown) ribbon.
- > Students must earn a 'Corona Aurea' before they graduate to the next level.
- > Chocolate bars are included with the awards!

Damocles was a friend of Dionysius, the king of Syracuse. Reflecting on the king's great wealth, Damocles claimed that there was no man more blessed than Dionysius. Dionysius gave Damocles the seat of honor at a lavish banquet, but suspended a sword dangling from a horse's hair above his head throughout the festivities. Damocles, of course, was unable to enjoy the banquet with the sword hanging over his head, and thus Dionysius proved his point, that no one is truly blessed who is always threatened by danger. The phrase now refers to 'an imminent danger.'



# Celebration of the Classics 2010 - Homer's Odyssey

The Summit Latin Club sponsored the 14<sup>th</sup> annual "Celebration of the Classics", a marathon reading of Homer's <u>Odyssey</u>. The event took place on Friday evening January 22<sup>nd</sup> and all day Saturday January 23<sup>rd</sup>.

Each year, the 'read-a-thon' rotates through 4 poems from classical literature: Homer's <u>Iliad</u>, Homer's <u>Odyssey</u>, Ovid's <u>Metamorphoses</u>, and Vergil's <u>Aeneid</u>. This year, we read the <u>Odyssey</u>.

The weekend brought to life one of the most influential poems in Western civilization. According to tradition, the blind Greek poet Homer composed the <u>Odyssey</u> in the 8th century BC. It tells the story of the Greek hero Odysseus and his adventures after the Trojan War. For 10 years, Odysseus faces ferocious monsters, terrible storms, and angry gods. And when he finally arrives home in Ithaca, an army of enemies await him in his own palace. In the end (of course!), the hero reunites with his son Telemachus and his faithful wife Penelope. Some of the most famous scenes from the <u>Odyssey</u> include: the blinding of the Cyclops, the witch Circe, the Land of the Dead, and the climactic 'contest of the bow.'

Over 100 students & parents attended the opening event on Friday evening. Here are some of the Friday highlights:

- The event opened in Knights Hall with **the public viewing of the projects**. All 166 Latin students, from 6<sup>th</sup> to 12<sup>th</sup> grade, recreated an important scene from the <u>Odyssey</u>. Projects included: dramatic performances, mosaics, 3D posters, dolls, illustrated children's books, multimedia presentations, and 3D models.
- Feasting is a big theme of the <u>Odyssey</u>. The ancient custom of hospitality demands that one properly entertain a stranger at the door, and Zeus Xenios (the protector of strangers) punishes those who break this law. The king of the gods will surely bestow good fortune upon **Mrs. Deanna Argo**, who (once again!) mobilized the parents and produced a wonderful spread of food & drinks. This year, the theme of the night was the 'Feast of the Suitors,' a reference to the many men who wanted to marry Penelope, the crafty & loyal queen of Ithaca. Everyone enjoyed sandwiches fit for a Cyclops, Calypso's grape leaves, bone-shaped Scylla-cookies, and boulder-sized rolls of the giant Laestrygonians.
- The Phaeacians feasted the stranger Odysseus and then entertained him with dancing, singing, and athletic contests. Following their example, student performances came after the sumptuous banquet. All performers received a 'Special Award' ribbon and the coveted 'Celebration of the Classics' t-shirt.
  - ➤ 6<sup>th</sup> grader Jacob Barnes and 7<sup>th</sup> graders Jesse Campbell and Natalie Pearl did a group presentation of the 'Blinding of the Cyclops.' The 3 of them were very poised during their performance and really brought the scene to life.
  - ➤ 11<sup>th</sup> grader Shirley Nunlist did a solo-version of the 'Blinding.' Her voices for the different characters highlighted their contrasting emotions.
  - ➤ The killing of Helios' cattle which doomed Odysseus' men was presented by 8<sup>th</sup> grader Chris Lee. His exclamations of anger made clear how Helios felt about the death of his prized animals.
  - ➤ 3 students offered differing interpretations of the famous 'Contest of the Bow,' the means by which Odysseus killed the arrogant suitors and regained possession of his kingdom. 7th grader Omar Khoury was confident throughout his speech and made good use of a bow he brought as a prop. 10th grader Max Williams showed that he was a true student-athlete, hurrying from his basketball game (a Summit victory!) to his dramatic performance of epic poetry. Last but not least, 9th grader Oscar Pullan's speech had the audience hanging on his every word, with well-selected pregnant pauses.
  - ➤ The live performances concluded with 11th grader Matt Ahlgren reading from his children's book, 'A Laestrygonian Lexicon.' These giant cannibals destroyed most of Odysseus' fleet and devoured his men. It included the couplet, 'X is for xenophobic, what I became, for after this shock I was never the same!'

- At this point, the lights dimmed and the 21st century imposed its will: **the multimedia presentations** had begun!
  - ✓ 7<sup>th</sup> grader Matthew Currie produced a Flash video of the 'Contest of the Bow.' The audience greatly enjoyed the appearance of Penelope and her explanation of how her next husband would be chosen. The images were vivid, and the dialogue was witty.
  - ✓ The 12<sup>th</sup> grade Ancient Greek class created a great video on the whole of the Odyssey. It involved channel-surfing from the Nature Channel (the attack of Scylla) to a commercial (the Charybdis 3000 toilet) to the Jerry Springer Show (Telemachus' anger that his father was never around). In spite of some sound problems, the senior skit was a hit!
  - ✓ The final presentation was a Flash video by 10<sup>th</sup> grader Mark Samaan on the 'Cattle of Helios.' It included: Odysseus sprinting to 'The Eye of the Tiger,' Zombie-Cattle, and a flashback to Circe's advice to Odysseus. It was a great finish to the student performances.

• Lastly, the evening concluded with a **'Certamen'** with all questions based on the <u>Odyssey</u>. 12 6<sup>th</sup> graders, 17 7<sup>th</sup>/8<sup>th</sup> graders, and 16 Upper Schoolers competed for ribbons, coveted 'Celebration' t-shirts, and – most of all – pride. The matches were very close. The 6<sup>th</sup> grade and 7<sup>th</sup>/8<sup>th</sup> grade competitions both went down to the final question, and the Upper Schoolers needed a sudden-death question to decide the winner.

The read-a-thon itself started promptly at 9:00 am Saturday morning. 10<sup>th</sup> grader Steven Malseed began: 'Sing to me, Muse, of the man of twists and turns' (ἄνδρα μοι ἔννεπε, μοῦσα, πολύτροπον in the original Greek). The first line opens with *andra*, the Greek word for man/hero (the poem focuses on Odysseus) and ends with *polytropon*, which means muchturning (the wandering of Odysseus and also his cunning mind). For the next 10 hours, over 50 different readers brought to life the famous story of Odysseus.

The reading came to an end in the usual fashion. The readers all joined together to recite the final passage, where Athena comes down and ends the conflict between Odysseus and the families of the slaughtered suitors. The time was 5:45 pm. The weekend was over.



# 2010 National Mythology Exam

This was the 21<sup>st</sup> year of the National Mythology Exam. It was taken in February by over 10,000 students in the United States, Canada, and Australia. The goal of the exam is to promote the study of classical mythology and literature in secondary schools. It has 50 multiple choice questions.

This year's exam had 3 sections:

- the main classical gods & goddesses Zeus, Aphrodite, Apollo, Demeter, etc
- Book 9 of Homer's Odyssey the cave of the Cyclops
- the Greek hero Herakles & his 12 Labors



<u>The Capture of Cerberus:</u> For his 12<sup>th</sup> Labor, Herakles had to travel to the Underworld to bring back the 3-headed watchdog Cerberus. Herakles is shown wearing the lion's skin and carrying a club. Cerberus is not only 3-headed but also covered in serpents. The Latin poet Ovid also describes Cerberus as 'Medusa-like.'

All Latin students in the  $6^{th}$  -  $9^{th}$  grades participated in this 50 question, multiple choice exam. Here is the sort of questions on this year's exam:

- ❖ To whom would a Roman warrior pray before a battle? (Mars)
- ❖ What name did Odysseus use to trick the Cyclops? (No One)
- \* What was the First Labor of Herakles? (the Nemean lion)

# 2009 NJCL Convention

14 Summit Latin students attended the 56<sup>th</sup> National Junior Classical League Convention at the University of California – Davis campus in late July.

The Junior Classical League is an academic youth organization dedicated to the promotion of the Latin language and classical civilization. Over 44,000 students from 1,000 schools in 49 states are members of the JCL. In Ohio, there are 40 schools with over 2,000 student members.

1,300 people attended the convention. This summer, the Ohio delegation was made up of 52 students, 11 teachers, and 8 college students. The convention was 5 days long, and everyone stayed in the dorms and ate in the dining hall on the UC-Davis campus. The week is loaded with activities: general assemblies, swimming, academic tests, dances, soccer, performances, certamen, workshops & lectures, ultimate frisbee, graphic arts competitions, nightly fellowships, track & field event, and much more.

He received 1<sup>st</sup> place for his creative Multimedia project on the famous beauty contest known as the Judgment of Paris (Helen – the face who launched 1000 ships - was declared the winner). Myles also received 1<sup>st</sup> place in both the Long and the High Jump and finished 9<sup>th</sup> Overall in Athletics.

12<sup>th</sup> grader **Beth Chambers** completed her tenure as the OH Editor of the Torch. She was one of the more vocal members of the OH delegation during the spirit contests against other states. Beth placed 15<sup>th</sup> on Hellenic History and 17<sup>th</sup> on the Mottoes test.

Out of 1100 students, **Tino won 5<sup>th</sup> in the Nation Overall in Academics!** In addition, he also placed in the top 10 in the essay contest and the 3 Graphic Arts projects he created — with a 1<sup>st</sup> in the Nation in Latin Greeting Cards. Tino was also a member of the 'Novice Level' Certamen team.



The theme of this year's competition was '**Olympians 2.0**,' and all questions involved the 2<sup>nd</sup> generation of the gods (all of whom were children of Zeus, the king of the gods): Aphrodite, Apollo, Ares, Artemis, Athena, Dionysus, Hephaestus, and Hermes. 70% of Summit students earned an award this year!





# 2010 Exploratory Latin Exam

The Exploratory Latin Exam is now in its 6<sup>th</sup> year. Its stated purpose is to promote enthusiasm for the classical world in elementary and middle schools. 2,000 Latin students from 40 states participated in the exam this year. It is a 50 question multiple choice exam on derivatives, Roman life, mythology, architecture, etc. This year's exam included 10 'special topic' questions on 'Life in Ancient Rome.'



When the Trojans were debating what to do with the huge Wooden Horse which Greeks had left on the shore, Laocoon (a Trojan priest) urged them to destroy it. He said, 'Whatever it is, I fear the Greeks even bearing gifts! Later, Athena & Poseidon sent 2 serpents from the sea which killed Laocoon and his 2 young sons. 
# **Special Book Award**

# 2010 OJCL Convention: Summit Takes the Championship!



A number of Summit students won 'Best of Show' out of all entries at the competition.


