This gold aureus has Augustus (called here Caesar, one of his many names) with a laurel wreath (representing victory) on the obverse side and a bull (based on a famous statue of a bull by the Greek artist Myron) on the reverse side.

# 2025 Classical Literacy Exam

The Classical Literacy Exam is given to all Latin students in May. This competition measures basic knowledge of all aspects of Greek and Roman civilizations, including vocabulary, expressions, mythology, history, culture, quotes, and geography. The various lists include terms like:

- quid pro quo (literally 'what for what,' now it means a trade or exchange)
- sowing dragon's teeth (when the Greek hero Jason did this in his quest for the Golden Fleece, armed warriors sprang up; it now means doing something that will cause great harm)
- de jure (literally 'from the law,' it now means sanctioned by law; e.g., apartheid in South Africa was de jure segregation of the races)
- protean (readily taking on different shapes, forms, or meanings; able to change quickly; the English word protean comes from Proteus, a sea god who could change his shape at will)



This is Oedipus solving the riddle of the Sphinx (What walks on 4 legs in the morning, 2 legs at midday, and 3 legs in the evening? answer: a human). Oedipus also had the unfortunate fate of killing his father and later marrying his mother, and his name was used by Freud for the Oedipus complex.

The Pegasus Mythology Exam is a multiple-choice test given every February to over 5,400 middle school students from across the United States. This exam includes the origins of the classical gods, the rule of the Olympians, and a special section on 'Ancient Beginnings.'



# 2025 Exploratory Latin Exam

Over 800 students competed in the 21st annual Exploratory Latin Exam. Its purpose is to promote enthusiasm for the classical world in elementary and middle schools. The ELE is a 50-question multiple choice exam on derivatives, Roman life, mythology, art & architecture, etc. This year's exam included 10 'special topic' questions on 'Ancient Roman Entertainment.' 35% of Summit 6th graders earned an award!

# 2025 Ohio Junior Classical League Convention

340 students (and teachers, adults, and college students) from 23 Ohio schools attended the state competition March 7-9 in Columbus. Summit sent a delegation of 28 students to compete.

# Summit placed 1st in Overall Points, 3rd in Total Per Capita Pts; and 3rd in Academic Per Capita Pts!



# 2024 National Junior Classical Leage Convention

Five Summit students attended the National Junior Classical League convention from July 21st – 27th on campus at the University of Tennessee in Knoxville, TN. Hana Conte '26, Tyler Gier '28, Kori McLane '25, Ben Hofmann '28 and Manuel Cantillo '28 competed against other Latin and Greek students from around the country in Creative Arts, Graphic Arts, Academic Tests, Athletics and Certamen.

Tyler excelled athletically during the week, placing 2<sup>nd</sup> in the 50-yd breaststroke. This placed him 25<sup>th</sup> in Olympika points and 47<sup>th</sup> in Overall Sweepstakes. Manuel also participated enthusiastically in the athletic competitions, running in the Track & Field Olympika. He cheered loudly for Ohio during the spirit competitions each day, contributing to Ohio's #1 finish in spirit for the week. Manuel also competed on Ohio's Novice certamen team, facing tough opponents from other states and narrowly missing the semi-final round.

Ben made up the other half of the Novice certamen team, performing his duties as team captain with aplomb. Ben's Latin skills were not confined to the certamen rooms, however, as he placed well on the numerous academic tests. He placed 4<sup>th</sup> in Latin Vocabulary, 4<sup>th</sup> in Reading Comprehension, 9<sup>th</sup> on the Academic Triathlon, 9<sup>th</sup> in Latin Grammar, 10<sup>th</sup> in Latin Derivatives, 12<sup>th</sup> in Mottoes, 12<sup>th</sup> in Mythology, 13<sup>th</sup> in Roman History, and 15<sup>th</sup> in Ancient Geography, all at Level I. Impressively, Ben placed 35<sup>th</sup> on the Academic Decathlon, a prestigious test for the Upper Level students designed to find the best all-around Latin student at the convention and comes with a \$500 cash prize. Ben's work placed him 30<sup>th</sup> in Academics at the convention. Ben also competed in the Olympika, with his 1<sup>st</sup> place finish in the 100 meter, 2<sup>nd</sup> place finish in the 200 meter, and 3<sup>rd</sup> place finishes in the 800 meter and Marathon contributing to his 14<sup>th</sup> place finish in Olympika. All of these points combined to place Ben 32<sup>nd</sup> in Overall Sweepstakes out of all 1000 students competing at the convention.

Appointed Historian of the OJCL in April, Kori documented the goings on of the students during the convention. Kori also played an integral role in leading the Ohio delegation as the OJCL President was unable to attend. Kori and the other officers recapped each day's events and encouraged the delegates to try new activities throughout the week. Impressively, Kori still found time to score points while performing OJCL board duties! In Academics: 13th in Reading Comprehension: Poetry and 15th in Classical Art, both at Level IV. In Graphic Arts, Kori's Black Pencil and Mixed Media each placed 2nd, Chalk/Pastel 3rd, Ink 5th, Charcoal 6th, Colored Pencil 6th, and Watercolor 8th. All of this added up to Kori placing 15th in Overall Graphic Arts points and finishing 39th in Overall Sweepstakes.

Hana also had a busy week at convention. She was elected 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice-President at the state convention in March and worked with Kori and the other board members to lead Ohio students through the week. Hana had just finished her term as OJCL Editor and her work on our state publication throughout the year earned the *Torch: Ohio* a 5<sup>th</sup> place finish! In Academics, Hana placed 2<sup>nd</sup> on Latin Vocabulary and 3<sup>rd</sup> on Mythology, both at Level III. Hana also finished 8<sup>th</sup> in the very competitive Impromptu Art competition and received a standing ovation for her amazing vocal performance of "Lost in the Brass" from the musical *Band Geeks* at the convention talent show, *That's Entertainment*. As Ohio is hosting next summer's national convention, Hana was also asked to deliver the closing remarks at the final General Assembly to close the convention. Addressing the 1200 plus attendees, Hana shared the impact of our recent Summit trip to Italy and Greece on her understanding of the ancient world and expressed her appreciation and hopes for the students of the NJCL and their continued growth and fellowship within the organization.

Also in attendance was alumnus Wali Khan '23. Having previously served a term as Parliamentarian of the OJCL, Wali was elected NSCL Parliamentarian at last summer's convention. He completed the duties of his office over the course of the year, which culminated with him running the elections for the college-level students of the organization.

MS/US Latin and Greek teacher Lisa Mays '05 continued to serve in her capacity as OJCL State Chair of Students, advising the OJCL board as they led the Ohio delegation through the various activities and competitions during the week.

# 2025 Medusa Mythology Exam

The Medusa Mythology Exam is a 40-question multiple-choice test given every April to over 1,900 high school students across the United States. This exam is challenging and requires a thorough knowledge of Greek mythology. The theme of this year's competition was 'Heroic Journeys' This year's theme focused on travels and adventures of famous Greek heroes like Jason in his quest for the Golden Fleece and Odysseus trying to return home to his family after the Trojan War.

23% of Summit students earned an award this year.



The Aegean Sea is named for King Aegeus of Athens. His son Theseus killed the Minotaur on Crete, but then forgot to change the sails on his ship from black (death) to white (life). Thinking that Theseus had been killed, Aegeus threw himself to his death in the sea.


